Farmer is my Strength, says **Prime Minister**

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Bengaluru: Prime Minister Narendra Modi sought to counter the opposition's charges of being anti-farmer and anti-poor by listing out schemes that his government had introduced to help both sectors and contending that his "neeyat" (commitment) would ensure that earnings would go into the hands of the common man and not the coffers of the rich.

'The farmer is my strength," he told a cheering crowd in the saffron stronghold of Basavanagudi here on Friday after a brain-storming session of the BJP's national executive, which discussed the land acquisition bill and how to "correct" the perception of rural India about the party's pro-poor intentions. Frishi Sinchai Krishi Sinchai Yogana was a trend-setter for

irrigating farm land. The Centre, he said, also introduced soil health cards and a scheme for tree-plantation as boundaries between fields rather than fences. There was no direct mention of land acquisition or the new bill that Congress and farmer organisations are opposing. Instead, Modi was bitter that the opposition was making political fodder out of farmers' issues.

Party president Amit Shah, in the inaugural address to the national executive, is said to have pointed to the direction BJP would take by attacking Congress on its 'anti-farmer' policies over the past 60 years.
